Wyoming Unemployment Insurance Claims Report, March 2020

Initial Claims Surpass 10,000 Amid COVID-19 Pandemic

Initial Unemployment Insurance (UI) claims in Wyoming increased by 621.6% over the year in March 2020 as businesses and schools were shuttered in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The total number of initial claims increased from 1,414 in March 2019 to 10,203 in March 2020 (8,789 more claims, or 621.6%).




Figure 1: Total Number of Initial Unemployment Insurance Claims for Wyoming by Year and Month, January 1997 to March 2020

There were more initial claims in Wyoming in March 2020 than in any other month dating back to 1997, the first year for which comparable data are available (see Figure 1). The 10,203 claims in March 2020 were nearly twice that of the previous high in December 2009 (5,975). In addition, the over-the-year increase of 8,789 new claims was the greatest since 1997. The previous record high over-the-year increase for one month was April

2009, when initial claims increased by 3,564, or 185.6%.

Initial Claims

Every industry experienced at least triple-digit percentage increases in initial claims over the year. Leisure & hospitality showed the greatest over-the-year increase, from 252 to 3,741 (3,489 more claims, or 1,384.5%). The increase of 3,489 more UI claims was more than triple the next closest industry: the unclassi ied industry increased by 1,082 claims, or 858.7%. The next largest increases were seen in educational & health services (870, or 1,225.4%) and construction (820, or 256.3%). Initial claims in mining increased from 86 to 652 (566, or 658.1%). The greatest percentage increase was seen in other services, which increased from 12 claims to

334 (322 claims, or 2,683.3%). See Table 1 (page 5) and Figure 3 (page 6).

At the county level, the greatest increases were seen in Natrona (1,423, or 649.8%), Teton (1,247, or 1,948.4%), and Laramie (1,171, or 676.3%) counties. Natrona and Laramie counties are the two most populous in the state, and Teton County has a large concentration of jobs in leisure & hospitality, the industry most affected by the COVID-19 pandemic in March. The number of out-of-state claimants increased by 1,029, or 428.8%. Sublette County also experienced a substantial percentage increase (91 claims, or 1,011.1%). Continued Claims

The total number of continued weeks claimed in Wyoming increased from 14,463 in March 2019 to 19,093 in March 2020 (4,630, or 32.0%). The total number of unique

claimants increased from 4,458 to 6,682 (2,224, or 49.9%) and the number of benefit exhaustees increased from 553 to 694 (141, or 25.5%). See Table 2 (page 7).

The greatest increases were seen in nonclassified (1,411, or 144.1%) and natural resources & mining (1,206, or 159.3%). The number of weeks claimed by out-of-state recipients increased by 1,457 (64.2%), and noticeable increases were also seen in Sweetwater (685, or 67.3%), Natrona (608, or 31.2%), Teton (449, or 150.2%), and Laramie (447, or 25.3%) counties, among others. 


Figure 2: Total Number of Unemployment Insurance Continued Weeks Claimed for Wyoming by Year and Month, January 2010 to March 2020




Figure 3: Initial Unemployment Insurance Claims by Major Industry in Wyoming, March 2019 to March 2020




Figure 4: Initial Unemployment Insurance Claims by County of Residence, March 2019 to March 2020




Figure 5: Continued Unemployment Insurance Claims by Major Industry in Wyoming, March 2019 to March 2020




Figure 6: Continued Unemployment Insurance Claims by County of Residence in Wyoming, March 2019 to March 2020
