# Updated Mean Earnings by Age, Gender, and Industry Tables by: Sylvia D. Jones, Senior Research Analyst

An update of tables showing annual earnings by age and gender in Wyoming reveals two trends: The number of workers for whom demographics are unknown continues to rise, as does the number of workers in the 55- to 64-year-old age group. A lack of demographic information often indicates nonresident status, and an increase in the 55 to 64 age group shows Wyoming's work force is aging.

Research & Planning (R&P) recently updated a series of tables on the Wyoming Labor Market Information website. These updated tables show annual earnings in Wyoming by age and gender for the years 2003 through 2005. Earnings figures and industry classifications are based on Unemployment Insurance (UI) Wage Records and represent a count of individuals who worked in Wyoming at any time during the year. Each person is represented one time, regardless of the number of jobs he or she worked.

One of the surprising pieces of information on the tables is the increasing number of workers in each industry for

which we have no demographic information in any of our administrative databases (Driver's License, Unemployment Insurance claims, etc). As is shown in Figure 1 (see page 3), the number of people for whom demographics are unknown has increased dramatically from 1994 to 2005. In 1994 only 7.5% of the total work force lacked known demographics. By 2005 this number increased to 18.8%. The increases were highest in the Construction and Leisure & Hospitality industries. The absence of demographics is most often associated with a nonresident status (Jones, 2002; 2004). Residency determination will be made in



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### Wyoming Labor Force Trends

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




July and summary statistics published subsequently.

Another interesting note is the increase in the number of workers age 55 to 64 (see Figure 2, page 4). In 1994, 6.8% of the work force was in this age range. The percentage rose to 10.3% (or 5,713 people) in 2005. This increase is further evidence Wyoming's workforce is aging.

The aging phenomenon is most apparent in Educational Services. Figures 3 and 4 (see pages 4 and 5) show the 2005 distribution of Wyoming workers in the state as a whole and in Educational Services, respectively. Statewide, 40.2% of working women and 39.6% of working men were age 45 or over. In Educational Services however, 55.0% of women and

52.0% of men were age 45 or over. If surrounding states are experiencing the same demographic shifts as Wyoming, our high school and college systems may see increasing pressure to educate more qualified teachers over the next 10-15 years. The Table (see page 5) uses R&P's staffing patterns (available at http://doe.state.wy.us/LMI/ staffingpatterns2003/staffingpatterns2003 .htm) to examine the distribution of employment in Educational Services. From it we can ascertain that most of the 5,713 reaching retirement age are teachers and administrators. In 2002, only 113 individuals graduated from a Wyoming community college with an education degree (Saulcy, 2004). While data from the University of Wyoming are unavailable, the



state may lack enough graduates available to fill upcoming shortages caused by retirement.


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

# Wyoming Labor Market in 2005: Faster Job Growth and Lower Unemployment

uring 2005, economic growth accelerated in Wyoming. Rapid employment gains in the state's Natural Resources & Mining industry (which includes oil & gas) pushed total job growth to 3.0%, its highest level since 1994. The statewide annual average unemployment rate decreased from 3.9% in 2004 to 3.6% in 2005. The percentage of Wyoming's civilian noninstitutional population age 16 and over that was employed (employment to population ratio) increased from 67.7% in 2003 to 68.1% in 2004 and 68.6% in 2005. This percentage remained well above the U.S. average in all three years (62.3% in 2003 and 2004, and 62.7% in 2005). Together, the decreasing unemployment rate and increasing employment to population ratio suggest a tightening in Wyoming's labor market. The state's civilian noninstitutional population age 16 and over grew by 1.5% in 2004 and 1.3% in 2005.

#### **Current Employment Statistics**

Wyoming total nonagricultural wage and salary employment increased from an annual average of 255,400 jobs in 2004 to 263,000 jobs in 2005 (see Tables 1 and 2, pages 7 and 8, respectively). This represents an increase of 7,600 jobs or 3.0%. Job growth was widespread. Some of the fastest growing industries between 2004 and 2005 were Natural Resources & Mining (2,500 jobs or 12.4%); Construction (1,200 jobs or 6.3%); Wholesale Trade (400 jobs or 5.5%); and Transportation, Warehousing, & Utilities (600 jobs or 5.0%). More modest gains occurred in Manufacturing (300 jobs or 3.2%), Retail Trade (300 jobs or 1.0%), Professional & Business Services (500 jobs or 3.3%),

Educational & Health Services (400 jobs or 1.9%), Leisure & Hospitality (600 jobs or 1.9%), and Government (700 jobs or 1.1%).

Job losses affected only a few industries including gasoline stations (-100 jobs or -2.4%), Administrative & Support & Waste Services (-100 jobs or -1.4%), Federal Government (-200 jobs or -2.6%), and State Government (-100 jobs or -0.6%). Employment was unchanged in Other Services and Information.

In Natrona County, employment increased by 1,000 jobs or 2.8% from 2004 to 2005 (see Tables 3 and 4, page 9). Reflecting the statewide trend, Natural Resources & Mining gained 500 jobs (16.7%) and Manufacturing gained 200 (12.5%). Employment growth also was seen in Wholesale Trade (100 jobs or 4.3%), Retail Trade (100 jobs or 2.1%), Educational & Health Services (100 jobs or 2.2%), and Leisure & Hospitality (100 jobs or 2.9%). Employment fell by 100 jobs (-3.4%) in Professional & Business Services.

On an annual average basis, Laramie County employment grew by 800 jobs (2.0%) from 2004 to 2005 (see Tables 5 and 6, page 10). Employment growth occurred in many industries including Natural Resources, Mining, & Construction (100 jobs or 3.7%); Wholesale Trade (100 jobs or 14.3%); Retail Trade (100 jobs or 1.8%); Transportation, Warehousing, & Utilities (100 jobs or 4.2%); and Educational & Health Services (100 jobs or 3.1%). Government (including public schools and hospitals) added 400 jobs or

3.2%. Professional & Business Services was the only industry that lost jobs (-100 jobs or -3.0%) from 2004 to 2005.

#### **Local Area Unemployment Statistics**

The statewide annual average unemployment rate fell from 4.4% in 2003 to 3.9% in 2004 and to 3.6% in 2005 (see Table 7, page 11). Most of the counties followed a similar pattern of decreasing unemployment. From 2004 to 2005, the unemployment rate decreased in 17 counties, was unchanged in 4 (Johnson, Lincoln, Niobrara, and Washakie), and increased in 2 (Goshen and Hot Springs). The largest decreases in the unemployment

rate occurred in Campbell, Carbon, Crook, Sublette, and Uinta counties (all decreased by 0.5 percentage points).

At the statewide level, the labor force (the sum of employed and unemployed individuals) increased at a healthy pace (up 5,064 people or 1.8% in 2005). Most counties saw a growing labor force in 2005. The few exceptions were Albany, Goshen, Hot Springs, Lincoln, Niobrara, and Platte counties. Four of those six counties are located in the southeast part of the state and have little oil & gas development. Workers from these areas may be migrating to other, faster-growing areas of the state.

## Wyoming Unemployment Falls in March 2006




Wyoming's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell from 3.3% in February to 2.9% in March. This level of unemployment is the lowest Wyoming has seen since 1979. U.S. unemployment also fell from February to March (down from 4.8% to 4.7%) but remained much higher than in Wyoming. Job growth continued at a relatively rapid pace (up 8,700 jobs or 3.4% from March 2005) mostly because of employment gains in Natural Resources & Mining.


From February to March, Wyoming added 3,000 jobs (1.2%). This level of increase is consistent with seasonal patterns. Natural Resources & Mining (including oil & gas) added 300 jobs (1.2%), Construction added 300 jobs (1.6%), and Retail Trade added 400 jobs (1.4%). Government employment (including public schools, colleges, and hospitals) increased by 1,100 jobs or 1.7% from February to March.

From March 2005, employment increased by 8,700 jobs or 3.4%. As in previous months, the largest job gains were in Natural Resources & Mining (3,300 jobs or 15.3%). Construction employment grew by 800 jobs or 4.4%. Other notable increases occurred in Wholesale Trade (400 jobs or 5.3%), Retail Trade (400 jobs or 1.4%), Transportation, Warehousing, & Utilities (500 jobs or 4.1%), Leisure & Hospitality (500 jobs or 1.7%) and Government (1,700 jobs or 2.6%). Employment fell slightly in Information (-100 jobs or -2.3%).

Most county unemployment rates followed their normal seasonal pattern and decreased from February to March. Washakie County was the only exception and its unemployment rate rose from 4.5% in February to 4.9% in March. 



The statewide total of 1,516 initial claims was the second lowest in nine years.







