Wyoming Unemployment Insurance Claims Report, September 2022 Continued Claims Drop to Lowest Total in 15 Years

Initial and continued Unemployment Insurance (UI) claims (see Definitions, page 9) in Wyoming continued to decline to near historic lows in September 2022.

Initial Claims




Figure 1: Total Number of Initial Unemployment Insurance Claims for Wyoming by Year and Month, January 2012 to September 2022

There were 924 initial claims in September 2022, down from 1,286 in September 2021 (-362, or -28.1%). The 924 claims also were lower than the 1,109 in September 2019, so current initial claims are 16.7% lower than pre-pandemic levels. Initial claims peaked in April 2020 at the start of the COVID-19 pandemic and have largely trended downward since (see Figure 1).

UI Claims Online

The 924 initial claims marked the fourth lowest one-month total since at least 2007.

The industries with the largest numbers of initial claims included construction (191), leisure & hospitality (135), trade, transportation, & utilities (117), and

professional & business services (66; see Table 1, page 5).

Laramie (161), Natrona (130), Campbell (67), Sweetwater (63), and Fremont (53) counties had the largest number of initial claims. In addition, there were 154 initial claims by out-of-state claimants (see Figure 4, page 6, and Table 3, page 9).

Continued Claims




Figure 2: Total Number of Unemployment Insurance Continued Weeks Claimed for Wyoming by Year and Month, January 2012 to September 2022

The total number of continued weeks claimed in Wyoming decreased from 6,882 in September 2021 to 5,138 in September 2022 (-1,744, or -25.3%; see Figure 2). The number of unique claimants decreased from 2,105 to 1,767 (-338, or -16.1%; see Table 2, page 7). Wyoming had 6,814 continued weeks claimed in September 2019, so currently they are 24.6% lower compared to pre-pandemic levels.

The 5,138 continued weeks claimed also marked the lowest one-month total dating back to at least 2007.

The industries with the most continued weeks claimed included construction (855), trade, transportation & utilities (658), government (378), and professional & business services (373).

There were more continued weeks claimed for out-of-state claimants (983) than for any single county in Wyoming. The counties with the greatest numbers of continued weeks claimed were Laramie (893), Natrona (795), Sweetwater (387), and Fremont (359).




Figure 3: Initial Unemployment Insurance Claims by Major Industry in Wyoming, September 2021 and September 2022




Figure 4: Initial Unemployment Insurance Claims by County of Residence, September 2021 and September 2022




Figure 5: Continued Unemployment Insurance Claims by Major Industry in Wyoming, September 2021 and September 2022




Figure 6: Continued Unemployment Insurance Claims by County of Residence in Wyoming, September 2021 and September 2022

Box: Definitions

Initial Claim: An initial claim is filed by an unemployed individual after a separation from an employer. The claim requests a determination of basic eligibility for the Unemployment Insurance benefits.

Continued Weeks Claimed: The number of weeks of UI benefits claimed during the reference period. An unemployed individual who has already filed an initial claim and who has experienced a week of unemployment and then filed a continued claim to claim benefits for that week of unemployment.
