


Employment and Wages

- Not covered: self-employed, gig jobs, people working in other states






Wyoming Employment, 2001Q1-2023Q4




Automobile Dealers (NAICS 4411)


- Professional, scientific, & technical Services

- Administrative & support & waste management & remediation services






Job Growth by County

- Campbell (828, or 3.4%)














- 2019 Average Monthly Employment: 277,114

- National average: 3.3%








- Professional & business services: 2,482, or 12.9%

Population Estimates


Wyoming 2023 Population: 584,057

Wyoming in 2023


- 10,460 total recipients record low
- 18.5% were out-of-state claimants
- 17.2% exhaustion rate
- 10.7 average weeks claimed
- \$45.1 million in total benefits paid
- Wage replacement rate: 38.6%

Top 5 Industries of UI Claimants








Job Openings and Labor Turnover Survey

- March 2024: 18,000 job openings
- Twice as many job openings as unemployed people







Demographics of the Workforce

Nonresidents

- Demographic data not available
- Commute to Wyoming from another state or country
- Could be individuals who moved to Wyoming but haven't obtained a driver's license
- 12% to 17% of all individuals working in Wyoming any given year





Demographics of the Workforce

Decline of Resident Workers

- Younger workers leaving the state
 - 50% of high school seniors not found working in Wyoming 5 years after graduation
- Older workers retiring or exiting the workforce
 - Individuals ages 55+ made up one-third of Wyoming population in 2022
- Commuting to other states
- Not captured in wage records





Telework

What Role Does Telework Play?


- 23.0% of U.S. workers teleworked in March 2024
- 10.9% teleworked all hours
- Top industries for telework:
 - Education & health services
 - Professional & business services
 - Wholesale & retail trade





Telework in Wyoming and Surrounding States

- Any hours spent teleworking
- Fewer teleworkers in Wyoming
- Could be a function of industrial makeup







Learning About New Residents

New Research

- New research linking surrendered driver's license with wage records
- 3,653 individuals in 2023
- 2,464 working, 1,189 not working
- Top 5 states: Colorado, Florida, Texas, Montana, Arizona





Learning About New Residents

Non-workers: Who Are They?

- 628 men, 561 women
- Average age: 45.0
- One-third age 55+





Learning About New Residents

New Wyoming Workers: Who Are They?

- 1,313 men, 1,151 women
- Average age: 37.9
- About 15% age 55+
- Largest group: 25-34 (690, or 28.0%)



Learning About New Residents

Men: Where Do They Work?

- Retail trade \$22,049
- Accommodation & food services \$16,845
- Educational services \$30,873
- Construction \$38,390
- Mining \$58,480





Learning About New Residents

Women: Where Do They Work?

- Health care & social assistance \$30,038
- Educational services \$27,368
- Accommodation & food services \$13,841
- Retail trade \$16,278
- Public administration \$28,695





Learning About New Residents

What Does this Tell Us?

- Proximity plays some role, but people move here from further away, too
- Men are drawn by high-paying jobs in industries like mining and construction
- Women are drawn by high-paying jobs in health care and educational services
- Lots of people come here for leisure & hospitality jobs, too

What Does the Future Hold?

Short-Term Industry Projections

- More than 8,000 jobs from 2023-2025
- Job growth projected for all industries
 - Health care & social assistance: 1,030 jobs, or 3.0%
 - Accommodation & food services: 934 jobs, or 2.7%
 - Professional, scientific, & technical services: 876 jobs, or 7.8%
 - Construction: 838 jobs, or 3.7%
